

Two-Year Spiritual Direction Formation Program:

This two year certification program for the formation of Spiritual Directors in the Christian tradition and for our time includes six on-site intensives, evaluated assignments to facilitate distance learning, and regularly recurring peer group check-ins via Skype or Google Hangouts.

Each 2.5 day intensive starts Thursday morning and concludes mid-day Saturday.

The six on-site intensive are:

- May 18-20, 2017: Integrated Practices Part I
Location: Camp McDowell in Nauvoo, AL
- Oct 19-21, 2017: The Practice of Spiritual Direction Part I
Location: Camp McDowell in Nauvoo, AL
- Feb 22-24, 2018: Co-Creativity with God
- May 2018: Integrated Practices Part II
- Oct 2018: The Practice of Spiritual Direction Part II
- Feb 2019: Sacred Story

The location of these intensives may vary, but will be in either Sewanee, TN, the Greater Huntsville Area, the Greater Birmingham Area, or at Camp McDowell in Nauvoo, AL. All specific locations will be posted to the website as 2017-2019 plans are confirmed.

In addition to the intensive themes listed above, the formation program will include the threaded topics of Dreamwork, Rule of Life, Mindfulness, and Know Thyself.

Tuition: Tuition of \$1800 covers the intensive programs, assignment evaluation and feedback. It also includes Thursday lunch & dinner and Friday lunch at each of the intensives.

The four tuition payments of \$450 are due on the following dates:
March 15, 2017, Sept 15, 2017, March 15, 2018, and Sept 15, 2018.

*Formation of Spiritual Directors

Spiritual Direction is a spiritual practice involving an intentional relationship for the purpose of cultivating greater depths of relationship with God, other people, all of creation, and the self.

The Holy Spirit is the Director.

The spiritual director offers attentiveness, holy listening, and guidance to another in order to strengthen and enliven the directee's spiritual life, which enables:

- Increased awareness of God's presence
- Greater responsiveness to God's call
- Transformation in intimacy with God
- Growth in our risen life in Christ.

What: A two-year certification program for the formation of spiritual directors in the Christian tradition and for our time.

Who: Those who have discerned gifts for or a sense of call to spiritual direction or spiritual companionship are invited to apply. Also, those who currently offer spiritual direction with a desire to grow in their practice are encouraged to apply.

This program is open to laity and clergy.

When: 2017-2019 Cohort starts May 2017 with completion in February 2019

Where: Distance learning and 6 on-site intensives in various locations:

- The Greater Huntsville Area in AL
- The Greater Birmingham Area in AL

The Rev. Mary Catherine Akamatsu is the Executive Director of Metagem Institute in Huntsville, AL. She received an M.Div. from Sewanee: The School of Theology and a B.S. degree in Computer Science from the University of North Alabama. Prior to seminary, Mary Catherine was an Executive Director at Qinetiq North America with responsibility for a corporate division that delivered large scale complex software systems. From her work as an executive, she brings an interest in process improvement, technology integration, and leadership development to her role in the church. Mary Catherine is a member of the Diocese of Alabama's Commission on Spirituality. She practices Centering Prayer, engages in dreamwork, and enjoys regular exercise.

She is a Spiritual Director, trained in Jungian practices at the Haden Institute in NC. Mary Catherine is frequently invited to lead prayer retreats and workshops on integrative and spiritual practices. She is currently studying under spiritual master teachers—Richard Rohr, Cynthia Bourgeault, and James Finley—at the Living School for Action and Contemplation. Mary Catherine is a life-long learner and gifted teacher. She is married to Jeff Akamatsu and is the mother of two young adults, Dillon and Martin.

The Rev. Kathryn Mary (Kammy) Young, AOJN is the Director of Contextual Education on the faculty of the School of Theology, Sewanee. Prior to teaching at Sewanee, she served for three years as Associate Rector of Christ Episcopal Church in Ponte Vedra Beach, FL where she directed the church's mission in the pursuit of deeper spirituality and justice. This calling followed ten grace-filled years of ministry with St. George Episcopal Church in Jacksonville, FL where she had been called in 1998 to serve as the first woman rector in the Diocese of Florida. While there she founded a silent retreat ministry center on Ft. George Island, partnering with the Order of Julian of Norwich, with which she is a vowed associate member. Kammy has been a proactive diocesan and congregational leader in implementing creative ministry development, continuing education and formation for clergy and laity, through innovative programs that deepen spiritual practices. Kammy received an M.Div. from Seabury-Western Theological Seminary and a B.A. in Religion from Florida State University. She is currently studying Ministry Development in Virginia Theological Seminary's Doctor of Ministry degree program. She is married to the Rt. Rev. George Young and they have two grown children, George and Lucy, who live in Pensacola, FL.



The Rev. Monica A. Carlson is the Rector of The Episcopal Church of the Epiphany in Leeds, AL. She is Co-Chair of the Diocese of Alabama's Commission on Spirituality. Monica received an M.Div. from Sewanee: The School of Theology, where she earned the honors prize for Practical Theology. She received a B.A. from Duke University with a double-major in History and English. Prior to attending seminary, Monica lived in Nashville, TN where she worked for many years as a real estate paralegal. For several months after seminary, Monica lived with the nuns of the Community of St. Mary, where she deepened her experiential knowledge of Benedictine Spirituality. She continues to live by a Rule of Life, to pray the Daily Office, and to practice Centering Prayer. Monica has led several workshops on spirituality. She enjoys long walks and cheering for the Duke basketball team, the New Orleans Saints, and the Tennessee Titans. Now living in Alabama, she has become a fan of local sports teams, as well.

Mr. Jeff Akamatsu, AOJN is an active lay minister with an interest in integrative health. He is trained in The Living Compass wellness program as a Congregational Wellness Advocate. Jeff is also a Stephen Minister, an associate member of the Order of St. Luke (healing ministry), a teacher of integrative and spiritual practices, an accredited Education for Ministry (EfM) mentor, a vowed associate member of the Order of Julian of Norwich, and a Haden Institute certified Spiritual Director. Jeff retired from a career with the federal government in human resources and from the Army as a Colonel. He is a former paratrooper, Army Ranger, Green Beret, and scuba diver. He received an undergraduate degree from West Point and a master's in business from



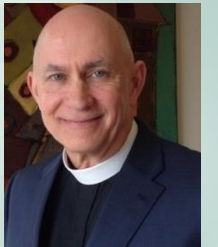

Ms. Beth Cook is a Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC) in private practice who has over 20 years of experience in psychotherapy. She has an interest in the interweaving of spiritual, emotional, and physical aspects of health. In 1987 after reading John Sanford's *Healing and Wholeness*, Beth began what would become a life-long study of Jungian psychology, creation spirituality, mythology, feminist theology, and Christian mysticism. In 2010, Beth became a certified Spiritual Director after completing the two-year Haden Institute training program. Beth has a particular interest in working with members of the LGBTQ community and others who have experienced marginalization from traditional religious groups. A member

of the Episcopal Church, Beth is drawn to practices ancient and modern from many faith and spiritual traditions including dreamwork, mindfulness, meditation, the Enneagram, Celtic spirituality, poetry, fairy tales, and the labyrinth. Beth leads Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction (MBSR) training programs and is a co-founder of the Alabama Institute for Mindfulness (AIM). She maintains a daily meditation practice. Beth is married to Tim Cook and they have one daughter, Bailey, who is a college freshman.

The Rev. Dr. Malcolm Lewis Marler is the Director of Pastoral Care at UAB Hospital in Birmingham, AL and is a Board Certified Chaplain. He oversees a department that cares for persons in the hospital, outpatient clinic, and community. Prior to coming to UAB Hospital, he was the first full-time Chaplain for HIV/AIDS patients in the United States. Malcolm began "The Support Team Network" in 1994 to support persons with HIV disease and then expanded it into a national program for persons with any healthcare need. Malcolm has taught thousands of people how to offer practical, emotional, and spiritual support to others who are sick, grieving, or healing. Malcolm played football for the Clemson Tigers and graduated from Clemson University with a B.A. in Psychology. He received an M.Div. and D.Min. from The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, KY, was ordained as a Baptist minister in 1978, and later was ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church. Malcolm's mission in life is to embody grace and compassion in all relationships. Malcolm lives in Birmingham, AL and is married to the Rev. Mary Bea Sullivan. They have two grown children, Brendan and Kristin (Kiki).



The Rev. Mary Bea Sullivan is the Associate Rector for Pastoral Care at St. Luke's in Birmingham, AL. She received an M.Div. from the Virginia Theological Seminary. Mary Bea is a spiritual director, retreat leader, and author. Her most recent book, *Living Awake: Forty Days Toward Renewal* offers simple, yet meaningful, spiritual reflections and practices that guide the reader toward emotional, physical, and spiritual restoration. She has been a staff development consultant at the University of Alabama at Birmingham and is trained in a number of personal development programs. A practitioner of contemplative prayer, Mary Bea is passionate about spiritual practice and how it informs our being, and bringing the Good News to a world seeking *Shalom*. Grounded in Christianity, she has been exposed to many different faith traditions, most notably Tibetan Buddhism. Mary Bea is interested in interfaith dialogue and inter-spiritual practice. She is thrilled to be a part of the Metagem Institute faculty because it offers an opportunity to participate in a learning community which is committed to bringing people closer to God, themselves, and others.
